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
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IT'S OUR WATERSHED MOMENT

A place where people come together from across the U.S. – professional architects, landscapers, city planners, and neighbors – to learn about water harvesting, green construction, and urban habitat preservation. University students study the site, monitor the impact, and share their research. Visiting conservationists from Peru, India, and Mexico take part in a residency to exchange information about sanitation and soil stewardship. Schoolchildren take a break from a gardening class to discover what hand-washing is like in rural India at the tippy tap demonstration. The Chef-in-Residence harvests native foods from the Heritage Garden to cook an organic meal for workshop participants. Local government representatives visit to better understand the potential implications for urban planning. Where is this hub of activity?

1. An area of land in which all water drains to a common outlet, such as a river, where the water draws together all life — soil, plants, animals, and people.

In the life of any individual or organization, there are pivotal moments when forces come together and change the course of the future – watershed moments.

Watershed Management Group is facing one of those defining moments right now.

In March 2012, WMG received a generous estate gift from donor Marguerite Fisher that included a 1,500-square-foot adobe home in midtown Tucson with grounds suitable to additional construction as well as demonstration gardens and water harvesting features. Thanks to Marguerite's groundwork during her lifetime, WMG was able to negotiate purchasing the property next door, providing an additional structure with 1,650 square feet. With both properties, WMG has the perfect hub for a growing organization, with space for offices, an education center, outdoor classrooms, and demonstration grounds.





Marguerite's gift comes just in time to leverage WMG's wave of momentum and growth.

WMG's community-building and education agenda is mounting to include:

- Expanding the Co-Op "neighborhood barn-raising" model to install green features in yards and neighborhoods across Tucson and other Southwest Cities;
- Training neighbors from all walks of life to green the streets together;
- Teaching the next generation of water harvesters;
- Building coalitions to conserve water and enhance rare river habitats;
- Helping people build healthier communities across the globe through improved sanitation and access to clean water;
- Turning waste into a resource through eco-sanitation and soil stewardship;
- Breaking new ground providing trainings in the growing green economy;
- Transcending language and culture through water-harvesting partnerships across the border.
- Public policy development and consultation with city planners and governments to ensure community-wide commitment to green infrastructure practices.
